7. County Warden's Welcome and Remarks

The Warden brought the following greetings:

"I would like to begin by offering my condolences to the family and friends of those we've lost to COVID-19. Our thoughts are with you during this difficult time.

More than 1,700 Windsor and Essex County residents were tested for COVID-19 in Windsor last week and hundreds more were tested at the Essex Arena yesterday. Hundreds more were tested in Kingsville earlier today and similar crowds are anticipated at a community-testing centre in Amherstburg tomorrow. This is very positive news.

I would like thank Essex-Windsor EMS for supporting this important outreach effort led by the Windsor and Essex County Health Unit. And I would like to thank the residents of Windsor and Essex County who took the time to get tested. Any resident who feels they may have COVID-19 or believes they may have come into contact with someone with COVID-19 should get tested.

It's a minor inconvenience that can yield positive results and potentially save lives. Increased testing will heighten local knowledge of the virus and its

patterns and can work to slow the spread, identifying asymptomatic carriers and limiting the exposure of others.

The Province has extended its State of Emergency until the end of June, but more and more businesses are continuing to open with physical distancing protocols in place. While these openings are a positive development, we must remain cautious and vigilant.

It is imperative we all continue to practice physical distancing and wear masks in public spaces where physical distancing is a challenge. It is imperative we all continue to wash our hands regularly and avoid touching our faces. We have done so much good work to slow the spread, but we can't let our guard down now.

Thank you to all of our frontline workers for everything you are doing to keep us safe and thank you to the Windsor and Essex County Health Unit for your unwavering commitment to public safety in these challenging times."

11.3 2019 County of Essex Consolidated Financial Report

Report Number 2020-0603-FIN-R008-SZ, dated June 3, 2020, from Sandra Zwiers, Director of Financial Services/Treasurer.

Sandra Zwiers presented the auditors findings and highlighted for Council key points that were identified during the audit. She explained that the consolidated statements included all departments for the County of Essex, the Essex Library Board (ECL) and the County's 50% share in Essex-Windsor Solid Waste Authority (EWSWA).

Ms. Zwiers noted that the package included the financial statements for the Sun Parlor Home resident's trust fund as well, as they are presented separately and are not consolidated into the County's statements. The Auditor, KPMG, provided the County with a clean (unqualified) audit for 2019. It was noted that the audit had been completed virtually 100%, due to the pandemic, with no notable issues. Ms. Zwiers noted that, new this year in the notes of the statements was a note regarding the pandemic which was referenced to acknowledge that the Corporation was unable to determine if there would be any significant impact to operations, but would continue to monitor and report on the situation.

Leo Meloche questioned if some of the reserve funds, not in immediate use by the County, could be transferred to the local municipalities, as they may experience cash flow issues, due to the lack of revenue being collected during the pandemic.

Richard Meloche sought clarification and additional information on the purpose of the rate stabilization fund and household counts. He further supported the County placing the funds into reserves, accessible for future capital projects, if needed.

Ms. Zwiers advised that assessment concerns, pandemic impact and service delivery concessions are all to be considered.

Warden McNamara noted the uncertainties that the pandemic (both current and possible future waves) brings.

Tom Bain supported the report and the municipal benefit of the County being in good shape.

Robert Maisonville advised that there would be a need for a large portion of Reserve Funds to be used in operations and capital initiatives (broadband, hospital, flooding, COVID, etc.) that would be a benefit to the entire community.

Aldo DiCarlo requested clarification about allocating funds as floating surplus.

Ms. Zwiers responded that the recommendation was that funds remain in the rate stabilization fund at this time and Administration would assess reserve balances and make recommendations in the draft budget for 2021.

Leo Meloche questioned the unspent Library capital funds.

Ms. Zwiers advised that she would review and respond at a later date.

Warden McNamara recognized the efforts of County Finance Staff and Management, and extended appreciation for the hard work.

Richard Meloche questioned when the County had last issued an RFP for audit services. In response, it was noted that it had been since the early 2000's.

Ms. Zwiers advised that KPMG continued to provide the level of service to the satisfaction of the County and that significant education had to occur when switching auditing firms. She expressed that there was value in maintaining continuity with KPMG, as their investigative work and depth of understanding of the County's operations was significant. She noted that there were very few auditors in the region that specialize in municipal auditing and that, taking into consideration of the relationship that exists between County, the City of Windsor and

EWSWA, it was optimal to engage an auditing firm that understood the synergy of the parties. She expressed that KPMG was an auditing firm that understood the broader picture, was reasonable, responsive, and that Administration believed that their proposal supported continued service with the County of Essex.





Dear Ministers:

I am writing today to add my voice, and those of Ontario's municipalities, to the call for urgent federal action to provide immediate funding for reliable broadband access across Ontario.

I have the privilege of meeting regularly with Mayors and council members from across Ontario. From the first day I took office, I have heard that lack of access to reliable high-speed internet service is holding communities, people, and businesses back.

We have worked together to partner with our local governments through our Broadband and Cellular Action Plan to support major investments in under-serviced areas in Eastern and Southwestern Ontario. To support this commitment, we have targeted \$315 million over five years to expand broadband and cellular infrastructure.

Now, as Ontario and our towns and cities are working together to respond to the COVID-19 outbreak, there is even more urgency to address gaps in service and high costs. However, we cannot do this alone - urgent investment from the federal government is required.

While in more northern and rural parts of Ontario internet availability can be limited at best, gaps in coverage persist in southern and urban parts of our province. For many in Ontario, the costs to access service are also prohibitively high.

The lack of broadband access in rural Ontario puts everyone in unserved or underserviced areas at a disadvantage – students seeking help on homework while learning remotely, seniors and other vulnerable individuals looking to access critical services, and business owners working hard to keep afloat and compete during challenging times.

Broadband limitations also restrict the services that rural and northern municipalities can provide to their residents. Ontario's municipal leaders and the citizens they serve must be able to embrace digital service delivery now to respond to the pandemic and to deliver public services efficiently and equitably over the long term.

I know that Ontario, our local governments and Canada all share the same goal: that we can bring our full potential to the task at hand to recover from the COVID-19 outbreak and the resulting impacts on our economy. Our Mayors, councils, community groups and citizens are already developing recovery plans and strategies. Broadband infrastructure is an essential building block, and we will need your commitment to invest, without delay, in the future of Ontario's towns and cities.

I have taken the liberty of copying the Minister of Families, Children and Social Development as I know Minister Hussen also has a strong interest in supporting and strengthening communities. As well, I have copied my colleague, the Honourable Laurie Scott, Minister of Infrastructure, under whose purview broadband falls.

Re: Issues regarding the mapping of Provincially Significant Wetlands (PSWs)

Norfolk County Council is working to address significant issues that have come to our attention regarding the mapping of Provincially Significant Wetlands (PSWs).

Following the Ministry's updated mapping related to PSWs, the County updated its Official Plan to bring its policies in line with the new mapping. Following that, the County planning staff introduced a Zoning By-Law amendment to update the zoning to reflect the new mapping and to provide consistency between the Zoning By-Law and the Official Plan. Though the mapping is wholly outside the County's process and control, the zoning by-law amendment was not approved by Council, flowing from significant public concern about the updated mapping affecting people's properties. In some cases, some of these changes were very significant.

The County submitted comments to the province as part of the review of the Provincial Policy statement requesting that the process for PSW mapping be significantly improved to allow for transparency and better land owner engagement, including, for example, a right of appeal or formal dispute resolution process. This will allow for land owners to be properly informed and engaged where land use designations that affect their property may result. The current process appears to be severely underfunded and without any meaningful way for affected residents to engage.

The County is seeking support from other rural municipalities who may be affected by this to address this issue with the province.



In 2006, the Ontario Ministry of Transportation (MTO) completed a study of Highway 3 from Outer Drive in Windsor easterly 33.5 km to Essex County Road 34, which was documented in a Transportation Environmental Study Report (TESR). The TESR was approved and MTO has implemented the improvements in three phases with Phase 1 and Phase 2 being constructed in 2009 and 2012, respectively.

Recently, MTO has initiated the Detail Design including completing a review of the 2006 TESR approved improvements for Phase 3, to widen Highway 3 from east of Essex County Road 23 easterly to east of Essex County Road 34 in the County of Essex. The 2006 approved improvements included widening Highway 3 from two to four lanes with a 15 metre grass median, realigning the South Talbot Road/ Division Road intersection, and closing Inman Side Road with a connection to Division Road.

THE PROCESS

The current study is following the TESR Review process for a Group 'B' project in accordance with the Class Environmental Assessment for Provincial Transportation Facilities, 2000 (Class EA). 
- The installation of new traffic signals at two intersections (Belle River Road (County Road 27) and County Road 18)

Purpose

To provide County Council with information concerning the on-going activities of the Planning Services Department.

Background

The Planning Services Department provides planning advisory services to County Council on matters related to County-wide land use planning, economic development, and strategic planning matters. This department also prepares responses to provincial policy and legislative changes and works with local municipal planners to resolve development issues and move new development forward. The Manager of Planning Services acts at the approval authority for plans of subdivision, plans of condominium, part lot control by-laws, and local Official Plan Amendments.

Due to the Provincial Emergency Order there have been impacts to the Planning Department's ability to move certain planning applications to completion. As it has not been possible to host statutory public meetings, municipalities were forced to cancel Council and Committee of Adjustment Meetings scheduled in March, April and in some cases to date.

The minor delay in processing Planning Act applications occurred until the enactment of Bill 189, the Coronavirus Support and Protection Act. Planning Act amendments have authorized the Minister of Municipal Affairs and

Housing to create regulations to suspend specified timelines associated with land use planning matters. The Amendments allow municipalities that want to pause applications and direct resources elsewhere to do so without the threat of appeal. Alternatively, municipalities can still make decisions on land use planning matters during this period of suspended timelines and they can consider using electronic and virtual channels as appropriate to engage and solicit feedback from the public.

The County Planning Department has hosted regular zoom meetings of the regional municipal planners to provide Provincial legislative updates and provide a County-wide planning information exchange. Throughout this state of emergency, County Planning Services has worked closely with local municipal partners to ensure the County's support for municipal decision-making preferences to focus on local health priorities or proceed with development applications. At present, the County municipalities have advised of an intent to move forward with many planning applications to host virtual public meetings and continue with local decision-making. Public engagement is an important part of the planning and development process and municipalities are altering the formats to encourage people to participate and respond utilizing formats that do not involve in-person gatherings.

Discussion

During 2019, a significant number of *Planning Act* applications were in the early stages of development including regular and on-going pre-consultation meetings with proponents and municipal planning/engineering administration. At the beginning of 2020, County Planning anticipated that the submission of subdivision and condominium applications would continue well above the previous ten year average. During March and April, there was a minor delay in processing planning matters while Essex County waited for the Provincial direction with regard to holding statutory public meetings.

The on-going demand to process subdivision and condominium applications continues to be high in Essex County. The request for residential development approval is equally spread throughout all of the municipalities. There appears to be a high interest in multi-residential unit forms of development including semi-detached and townhomes. This form of development provides the benefit of compact urban form creating walkable communities and affordability. Further, this form of housing provides an alternative choice of housing for the aging population to remain within their community. The County Planning Department continues to provide advice to

developers and expedite new development to the greatest extent possible while meeting Provincial and County policy requirements.

Long Range Planning Initiatives in the County

There has been a delay in finalizing the Request for Proposal and associated workplans for the population, housing and employment projections and the regional economic development and employment land strategy. Due to the COVID health emergency, planning resources and priorities were at times shifted to assess planning implications and Provincial directives and provide this information to the seven municipalities.

Regional Flood Hazard Vulnerability Prioritization

In response to the on-going threat of shoreline and inland flooding, the Essex Region Conservation Authority (ERCA) has been engaged to project manage a flood hazard vulnerability prioritization for Essex County. The findings of this study will be used to update and determine the need for additional floodplain mapping (shoreline and inland watersheds) based on current land use and climatic conditions. Dillon Consulting has been selected to undertake this work for the County and ERCA based on significant experience and their present work on a new Federal Floodplain Mapping Guideline document providing common practices for determining where to conduct flood mapping projects.

A component of this analysis will also use GIS Hazard Risk Screening of historic high and 1:100 year water level data for the Detroit River, Lake St. Clair and Lake Erie, potential shoreline flooding extents will be mapped out throughout the study based on elevation and latest aerial photography. Based on this analysis, priority reaches along the shoreline will be identified on the final map to determine areas susceptible to greater damages due to coastal flooding. It is intended that once this watercourse and shoreline flood prioritization mapping is completed that the County and municipalities will pursue strategic updates to regional floodline mapping that will better inform emergency management practices, community preparedness and mitigation strategies, empower citizen decision making, and support climate change adaptation.

County of Essex Regional Energy Plan

The Manager, Planning Services is acting as the main liaison on behalf of the County for the development of the County of Essex-Regional Energy Plan. Energy production and use accounts for over 80% of Canada's greenhouse

gases. Canadians are already feeling the costs of a changing climate with an increase in the frequency and severity of floods, drought, wildfires, disease and heatwaves. The City of Windsor, the County of Essex, the Town of Amherstburg, and the Town of Tecumseh have joined over 500 Canadian municipalities in declaring a climate emergency.

Since 60% of energy consumption and over half of all GHGs in Canada are influenced by communities and in response, more than 400 Canadian communities have developed community energy plans to establish local priorities for reducing energy use and energy-related emissions. The Regional Energy Plan will support the County of Essex and its local municipalities and take future strategic actions in reducing GHG emissions that arise within its geographic boundary from energy use.

The Manager, Planning Services is a member of the project team for the Lakeshore Shoreline Management Plan, Lighthouse Cove Secondary Plan, and Regional Planners Climate Change sub-committee. County Planning is also part of the project team participating in the review of the Wallace Woods Secondary Plan and associated subwatershed study.

Local Official Plan Updates

Presently five of the seven local municipalities are embarking on the mandatory five year review of municipal Official Plans. County Planning is in regular contact with each of the municipalities as well as the Manager, Planning Services, Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing (MMAH) to authorize Provincial Policy conformity. The Provincial Policy Statement (PPS) 2020 came into effect on May 1st and as such, MMAH has advised that all municipal Official Plans under development are required to be in conformity with the new PPS.

Financial Implications

Due to the number of planning applications accepted in early 2020 and anticipated for the remainder of the year, department revenues are expected to be favourable. The development industry continues to move forward with a large number of residential and commercial developments through-out the County, indicating a high level of confidence in new lot sales. Future property taxes resulting from the development processed by the County in

2020 is assessed through MPAC's process. The taxes are shared between associated municipalities and the County of Essex.

Purpose

The purpose of this report is to provide to County Council information and recommendations pertaining to tender results for Capacity and Safety Improvement Project at the intersection of County Road 11 (Walker Road) and South Talbot Road, in Tecumseh, Ontario.

Background

The intersection is currently under temporary traffic signal control. CIMA Consulting was retained in 2018 to review the intersection and develop alternatives. Options that were reviewed included a comparison of a future signalized intersection, which adds a left-turn lane in all directions and permanent traffic signals, and a single-lane roundabout. The report concluded that a roundabout is the best permanent solution for the intersection. CIMA completed the detailed design of the single lane roundabout. A report to Council **2019-1016-IS-R027-JM** in October, 2019 introduced this project and identified the need to acquire properties to support the intersection improvement. A second report to Council **2019-1120-IS-R029-JM** in November 2019 obtained the County Council approval to expropriate the required land.

Discussion

The intersection of County Road 11 and South Talbot Road has potential safety concerns and temporary signals were erected to mitigate traffic and motor vehicle accidents.

This existing intersection will be upgraded to a single lane roundabout designed and constructed to the latest best practices for full truck accommodation. The overall scope of this project includes land acquisition through expropriation, utility relocation, drainage improvements, environmental approvals, significant agency and public consultation and construction.

The construction of roundabouts in regards to constructability issues and methodologies are significantly different from typical intersection reconstruction projects. Typically, full closures of each leg of the intersections are required for various lengths of time. Given the high volume of traffic on County Road 11, portable traffic alternating signals will be employed during construction on County Road 11 while full closure of South Talbot Road is required for safety reasons. A construction period of 4 months is anticipated and is expected to start in July. A full closure of County Road 11 will be required in short intervals to complete certain works and a formal signage and detour plan has been developed and is presented in Appendix A.

The County of Essex has been extremely diligent in its design, construction methodology and planned communication / education program. Roundabouts have been installed on the County Road Network in previous years and are viewed as a success and creates a viable option for future projects. These efforts have resulted in positive feedback from roundabouts constructed on County Roads at the intersection of CR22 and 2; CR23 and 8; and CR 31 and Mersea Rd 3.

The proposed works were advertised through the County of Essex e-tender system and tenders were received on June 4 2020. Results of the tenders are as follows, prices are exclusive of all taxes.

Contract Administration








STAGE 1A CONSTRUCTION

Purpose

This report is to present the details of the special meeting of the Western Ontario Wardens' Caucus called on Thursday, June 4, 2020, and seek support of County Council and solicit support from its seven local municipalities to request our region's fair share of broadband infrastructure funding from the Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission (CRTC) and directly through the Federal Government, as part of the Innovation, Science and Economic Development (ISED) Universal Broadband Fund.

Background

At its meeting held on Thursday, June 4, 2020, the Western Ontario Wardens' Caucus reviewed a set of recommendations for the future of the WOWC's investments in high-speed fibre. David Mayberry, Chair, SWIFT Board of Directors and Barry Field, Executive Director, SWIFT provided an update on the current SWIFT program and presented recommendations on how SWIFT 2.0 should be structured and funded. Accompanying this report is the presentation that was provided to the members of the WOWC.

The attached minutes detail the meeting, including the six recommendations that were approved.

Funding Request for Broadband Infrastructure in Southwestern Ontario

In addition to the decision to support SWIFT 2.0, the WOWC must have a plan to advocate for our region's fair share of CRTCs \$750M Broadband Fund. WOWC and our Member Counties and local municipalities should be advocating for 10% (or \$75M) of the funding as the region represents 10% of the population of Canada. WOWC must also advocate for the region's fair share of Innovation, Science and Economic Development (ISED) \$1.7B Universal Broadband Fund. Applications are opening this year and WOWC should once again be advocating for 10% (or \$170M) for Southwestern Ontario based on population.

Southwestern Ontario was left out of the last round of Connect to Innovate (CTI) funding and this cannot happen again. In order to ensure that the region, fifteen Member Counties and local municipalities receive their fair share of funding, this advocacy will take the form of a letter writing campaign by the WOWC, Member Counties and local municipalities. Two letters are attached to this report, one to the CEO of CRTC and the other to the Honourable Navdeep Bains, Minister of Innovation, Science and Industry.

Conclusion

Increased funding from both the Province of Ontario and the Government of Canada is urgently needed to address our region's large connectivity gaps, so that we can close the digital divide and restart our economies. The Western Ontario Wardens' Caucus supports the funding of existing shovel ready, municipally led models that will connect our rural economies at an accelerated pace. We support SWIFT as Southwestern Ontario's funding mechanism to advance the expansion of critical broadband infrastructure across the region. The model works, it delivers results and can be immediately leveraged to upgrade networks and coverage in our region's underserved areas.

Families and businesses in our rural areas have been shut out of the economy and society as a result of the pandemic. COVID-19 has underscored the need in urgency to address gaps in broadband services across our region.

Financial Implications

Financial consideration related to the CRTC and ISED programs are not known at this time. Matching municipal contributions may be necessary to

secure program funding; details of programs, once provided, will be shared with County Council and local municipalities.

SWIFT 2.0 Funding parameters are currently being reviewed by Administration and a subsequent report will be brought forward to County Council for consideration following greater detail on SWIFT 1.0 outcomes for Essex County and as part of the 2021 Budget, as appropriate.

Recommendation

That this report be received for information; and

THAT consideration be given for the County of Essex to sign the letters requesting funding from the CRTC and ISED Broadband Programs.

- Have received letter from Minister Clark to Minister Bains and others with regard to extra funding timing good Western Wardens should support Minister Clark's ask, funding needs to be expanded quickly.
- Letter of support from Chair Ginn in support of broadband dollars for southern Ontario
- Warden McNamara noted his desire to move the recommendation.

David Mayberry offered thanks and expressed the need to keep pushing, and to have the proposal ready expeditiously – there is no time to waist. The SWIFT Board fully supports all of these recommendations. The Caucus has given the SWIFT Executive much to do, but there is also much work for the Caucus to do, and it is encouraged to reach out to SWIFT for assistance as may be required.

Warden White offered thanks to David Mayberry and Barry Field for their efforts and presentations today, and asked if this information could now be shared.

Barry Field - yes, but without SWIFT branding.

Don Shropshire – the faster the information can get out the better.

Warden McNamara – question as to when OMAFRA may release Phase 3, as some will be asking for more when have yet to receive first round. There is a need to be able to close the chapter on one to get to the next, if could give a nudge.

Warden Cornell –WOWC name could go on the presentation, and that is what is shared.

Warden McQueen – go to our lower-tiers first?

Chair Ginn – need two letters from WOWC, one in support of Minister Clark's request, and a second to upper, lower and single tiers, with the recommendations passed. Press will pick up on the communications from their agendas.

Meighan Wark – can have a full package with template report, presentation, press release can all be prepared and ready by next week.






