#### 14.2. Removal of Interprovincial Trade Barriers

Michael Akpata raised the following:

Whereas the recent threats of an imposition of tariffs on Canadian production would have had a substantial effect on the items produced in the County of Essex.

And that there has only been granted a 30-day reprieve before they may be implemented.

And that these tariffs were going to be applied by another country and therefore can be deemed as being external to the Province and the Country.

And Whereby the Internal trade has been deemed by the Canadian Federation of Independent business (CFIB) to represent 18 % of Canada's GDP. And that in July, the CFIB released a report that said removing interprovincial barriers could boost the economy by up to \$200 billion annually. And that items produced, grown, and manufactured in Essex County are sent across Canada and are in many cases subject to these interprovincial barriers.

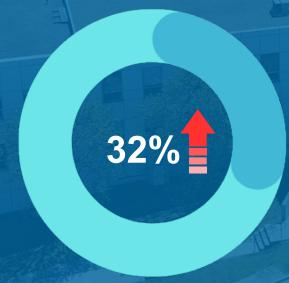

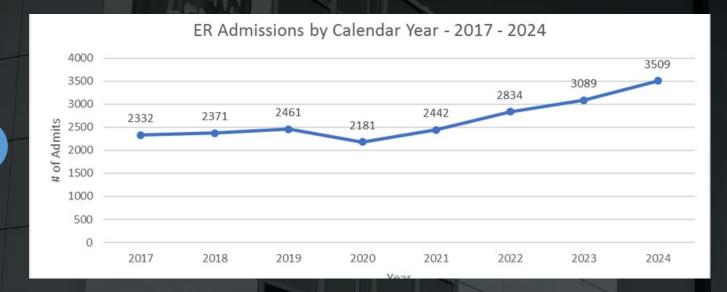

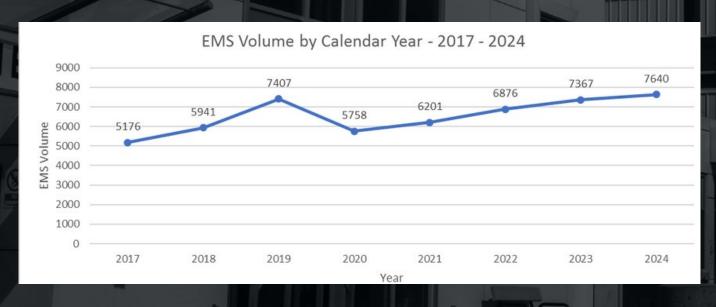

That Council **DIRECT** Administration to apprise through direct correspondence the Premier and all relevant Provincial Ministers, as well as, all local representatives elected to Senior Levels of Government, the County of Essex and the Municipal Councils in Essex County of the passing of this motion; and,

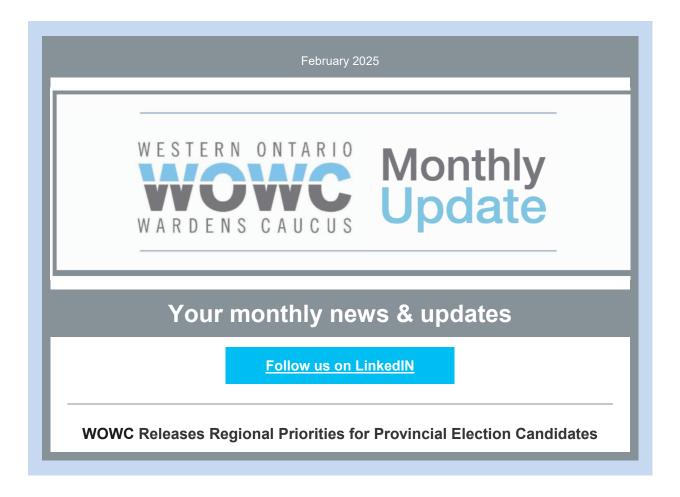

#### Motion to Draft Bylaw Reducing Chatham-Kent Council Size Approved



Chatham-Kent Council has approved a motion by Ward 1 Councillor Melissa Harrigan directing staff to bring forward a bylaw that would reduce Chatham-Kent's Council size to 14 Councillors and one Mayor. This change is based on

recommendations by consultant StrategyCorp. If approved, these changes are expected to take effect for the 2026 election.

The motion included one amendment to the proposed boundaries in StrategyCorp's Report titled "Option 1". The amendment, brought by Councillor Jamie McGrail, will shift the community of Mitchell's Bay from the new proposed ward 5 to the newly proposed ward 4.

The new ward boundaries, if the bylaw is approved, will consist of eight new wards, up from the previous six. Three wards in Chatham with two councillors each, three wards in the county with two councillors each, and two wards in the county with one councillor each.

If the bylaw is approved, this will be the first time Chatham-Kent has updated its ward boundaries since amalgamation in 1998. The proposed Council composition and ward boundaries reflect the significant change in the community since then and would ensure the electoral system continues to provide a system of effective representation at least through to the 2030 Municipal election.

The proposed changes are a result of significant public consultation, including two separate surveys and four public consultation sessions. The General Manager welcomed returning Board Member, Kirk Walstedt. She thanked Board Member Fred Francis for his contributions to the Board in 2024. Mr. Francis will return to the Board in 2026.

#### 3. Election of Chair and Vice Chair for 2025

The General Manager stated that per the agreement between the City of Windsor (City) and the County of Essex (County) that created the Authority, the positions of Chair and Vice Chair rotate between the City and the County on a yearly basis. She noted that for 2025, the Chair will be a County of Essex Board member and the Vice Chair will be a City of Windsor Board member.

In the event there are more than one nominee for each position, all Board members will vote by ballot.

#### 8. Waste Diversion

A. Source Separated Organics Hauling at the Essex-Windsor Solid Waste Authority Facilities

The General Manager presented the report and recommended the Board approve the execution of the extension provision included within the existing contract with 1869096 Ontario Limited (operating as Canadian Transfer Essex Waste Depot (CT)) for the hauling of refuse to the Essex-Windsor Regional Landfill (RL) from the Windsor Transfer Station (TS1) and Transfer Station 2 (TS2) in Kingsville for a period of 5 years. Further, that the Board approve the amendment of the existing refuse hauling contract to include the provision of Source Separated Organics (SSO) hauling services from the Essex-Windsor Solid Waste Facilities to Seacliff Energy (Seacliff) located at 1200 Mersea Road 1 in Leamington, Ontario, or to another processing facility as directed by the Authority under the same terms and conditions of the base contract.

She explained that the Authority must retain a service provider to haul SSO material from Authority facilities to Seacliff. Since CT is currently transferring waste for the Authority, Administration engaged in discussions with CT to amend the hauling contract for refuse from its sites to include the hauling of SSO from the Authority's new SSO Transfer to Seacliff.

She noted that amending the contract with CT will offer synergies with refuse hauling and eliminate the need for a short-term contract. CT provides excellent service and the Authority is pleased with their work.

The General Manager asked if there were any questions. No questions were asked.

B. Promotion & Education Plan for the 2025 Green Bin Program Launch

The Manager of Waste Diversion provided an update on the Promotion and Education (P&E) Program Plan for 2025 that Administration has developed to prepare Essex-Windsor for the Green Bin Program launch the week of October 21, 2025. This comprehensive plan will inform, engage, and connect local residents and partners to the launch of the Green Bin Program.

The report identified a number of communication campaigns that will be rolled out in 2025 through multiple media strategies and partnerships (e.g., municipal) including:

- Campaign 1: Grow Green in 2025 This campaign will be initiated with the reveal of the new EWSWA Logo and ask partners and residents to go green in 2025 with the Authority.
- Campaign 2: Grow Green with the Green Team The Green Team, a group of diverse Green Superheroes selected to help engage residents in the program and lighten the conversation around the program will be launched in Q2 (e.g., annual Earth Day event).
- Campaign 3: Bin Roll-out The key message here is that the "Bins are coming!" and advise residents on when their Green Bin Kit will be delivered to their home.

- Campaign 4: Green Bin Launch: "How to be ready" The key message is that the Green Bin Collection Program starts the week of October 21, 2025 for Phase 1 municipalities and many pieces of information on how residents can be ready for collection will be shared.
- Campaign 5: How Are We Doing?/Prep for Winter This will provide feedback on Green Bin participation and opportunities to improve participation and/or usage of the program and provide tips for the winter.

Mr. Shepley asked if this information is being included in the 2025 collection calendar.

The Manager of Waste Diversion confirmed this information will be included in the 2025 calendars. She also noted that information for Phase 2 municipalities will also be included.

Mr. McKenzie asked if any groups inquired or expressed interest in participating in the public education.

The Manager of Waste Diversion stated no organizations have yet to reach out. The Authority is looking at a partnership with the migrant community and the Multicultural Council of Windsor to assist with language translation.

Mr. McKenzie believes that apprehension from residents is anticipated. He asked what type of message would assist with apprehension.

The Manager of Waste Diversion stated that Campaign #2 will focus on debunking any myths or apprehension regarding pests, cold weather situations and odours. The Authority will produce videos on how to use the system successfully. The Authority benchmarked other municipalities and it has been advised that apprehension should be addressed. The Authority will be working alongside the City of Windsor to align with their transition to bi-weekly garbage collection as well as looking for ambassadors to assist with P&E.

Mr. Kaschak asked if P&E will be conducted in grade schools.

The Manager of Waste Diversion stated that school education is not part of the first year of the rollout of the program. The Authority will reach out to teachers to engage with their students.

Mr. Kaschak asked if it has been decided which items will be accepted in the green bin.

The Manager of Waste Diversion stated that the items have been identified in order to award the processing contract.

There were no further questions.

#### 11. New Business

A. Collection Calendar

In light of the recent issues with garbage collection in the Town of Essex during the holidays, Mr. Shepley requested that the Authority share the municipal collection calendar development process and provide a possible solution to ensure that this would not happen again.

The General Manager stated that this was an unfortunate situation because it was during the holiday season but was pleased that the Town of Essex was able to work with the contractor to provide a solution. She noted that the Authority does not have any legal right to deal with the contractor as the waste collection contract is between the municipality and the contractor, not the Authority. She referred to the Manager of Waste Diversion to explain the development process of the collection calendars.

The Manager of Waste Diversion provided a detailed explanation of the process that is guided by a Letter of Understanding (LOU) and a standardized data collection form. The process is led by the Authority's Communications

Coordinator. She noted that the Letter of Understanding was developed approximately 5 years ago as a result of timeline issues with some municipalities and to eliminate errors.

The Manager of Waste Diversion outlined the design process of the calendars:

- The first draft is sent to the municipal lead to verify yard waste, recycling and waste collection dates as well as any municipal information (i.e. Council dates) that the municipalities provided.
- The second draft is sent to the municipal lead in early October. As the first and second drafts are prepared, municipalities are working with their collection contractor.
- The third draft is sent to the municipal lead the second week of December. Municipalities are provided 3-4 weeks to review the last draft.

Although the collection dates are provided by the municipality, in an attempt to identify how the error occurred Administration discussed the situation with the municipality and after a review of the process, noted opportunities to ensure correct information is received. A suggestion to the municipalities is to have the contractor sign off on the final draft of the calendar. It was also noted that the Authority requests 3-4 revisions/drafts but actually 5-9 revisions are received.

While this process has been successful for many years and most municipalities for the 2024 calendar, as a result of the recent issues, Administration is reviewing the current process and looking for opportunities to enhance it to reduce staff resources and publication errors. Administration will be meeting with its municipal partners in the coming weeks to discuss opportunities that will form the 2026 calendar process. She noted that all municipalities should review the 2025 collection calendars upon receipt and before they are distributed to residents.

Mr. Shepley thanked Administration for the excellent description of the process. He appreciates the Authority for extending hours to receive the garbage.

The Chair asked if there were any further questions or new business. No further questions were asked.

## **Purpose**

The purpose of this Report is to provide Council with an opportunity to review the Council/Staff Relations Policy (the "**Policy**"), in accordance with the Policy and Procedure Governance Framework as well as the requirement in the 2019 Policy (the "**Current Policy**") which states that the Policy shall be reviewed once in a four-year term. This review includes proposed changes that are intended to clarify some language within the Policy, and to align the Policy with current language in other governing documents and with the County's Strategic Plan.

## **Background**

Section 270(1)(2.1) of the *Municipal Act, 2001* provides that a municipality shall adopt and maintain policies with respect to the relationship between members of council and the officers and employees of the municipality.

The **Current Policy** (a copy of which is attached hereto as **Appendix A**) was approved by Council at a meeting held on February 2, 2019, which is the last time the Policy was reviewed.

Administrative Report 2019-0220-CCS-R001-MB, briefed Council on the Current Policy and incorporated various Council conduct related policies and procedures into one document for ease of reference. In 2019 Bill 68 required that certain specific revisions to the *Municipal Act, 2001* regarding the complaint procedure and investigations by the Integrity Commissioner be included.

Since that time, the County has updated its Code of Conduct for Council Members and Members of Local Boards to align with the *Municipal Conflict of Interest Act* ("**MCIA**") and further has procedures in place with an Integrity Commissioner, to facilitate Accountability and Transparency. The proposed

revised Policy is attached hereto as **Appendix B**, which shows the marked-up version, as Council has previously requested to see any changes outlined. This version can be challenging to review, therefore a final draft version of the Policy without the markup has also been included as **Appendix C**.

#### Discussion

In 2024, the County adopted its first Strategic Plan, which provided, among other things, direction for Council's own decision-making and for the execution of the County's vision, mission, and values, through Strategic Goals, such as Working as Team Essex County, Growing as Leaders in Public Service Excellence, and Building a Regional Powerhouse. The Council/Staff Relations Policy fits within several elements of the Strategic Directions, namely 'Focusing "Team Essex County" for Results', 'Being an Employer with Impact', 'A Government Working for the People', and 'Promoting Transparency and Awareness' within the municipal services provided by the County. These goals have been considered in the edits proposed to the Policy.

# Clear direction will support County Council, staff, and partners in advancing shared priorities:

The County's Strategic Plan is seen as an important opportunity for the County to enhance unity and collaboration between Council and between Council and staff, as all work towards a collective vision. Clear alignment and understanding among Council and staff regarding the County's vision and priorities will help Council and leadership effectively guide the organization through key decisions, such as how to best plan for growth and what the role of the County should be for the broader region. (Strategy Corp)

Administration has been in the process of reviewing and standardizing all of the County's policies, which has resulted in the review of the Current Policy, that had been slated for review sometime during this term.

## **Research and Comparison**

Through the process of reviewing the Current Policy, Administration reviewed several Council/Staff Relations policies from other municipalities locally, and of comparable upper-tier municipalities in Ontario. It was determined through that research, that the County's Current Policy, although out of currency with some of the incorporated language references, was laid out similarly, and included many of the same components as comparator municipalities.

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There are no significant changes being proposed to the Current Policy. Proposed changes included in the draft Policy appended to this Report relate primarily to language within the definitions of the Policy, to allow for greater transparency and clarity on the meaning of certain terms and definitions (See Section 3.0), as well as to the Responsibility section, which is now more comprehensive than in the Current Policy. Other changes are primarily related to quoted excerpts from other guiding documents.

The sections dealing with quoted references from the Codes of Conduct (see Sections 5.1 and 5.2) were updated to current language as was the language associated with the Harassment and Workplace Violence sections (see Sections 5.3 and 5.4). The County's Procedure By-law excerpt was updated as well (see Section 5.5).

The alignment of the complaint procedure for complaints related to members of Council was changed to ensure that the process involving the County's Integrity Commissioner is followed as outlined in the Code of Conduct for Council Members and Members of Local Boards, and removes the need to disclose complaints to the Clerk (see Section 6.0).

Further proposed changes in the draft proposed Policy relate to formatting to ensure the Policy aligns with a consistent approach for reviewing new policies within the County's established policy framework.

## **Policy and Procedure Governance Framework**

In 2021 Council adopted the County of Essex Policy and Procedure Framework, which outlined the method to be used for the administration of policies and procedures as well as the approval authority for these important guiding documents.

As part of the reconciliation of the County's existing policies against this new Policy and Procedure Governance Framework, the Policy will be reviewed by Council on the prescribed cycle of every four years at minimum and certainly once per term of Council.

## 1.0 Policy Statement

The Corporation of the County of Essex will promote a respectful, tolerant and harassment-free relationship and workplace between Members of Council and the officers and employees of the Corporation, guided by the Code of Conduct for Members of Council, the Employee Code of Conduct, the employee Harassment in the Workplace Policy, the Workplace Violence Policy, and the Procedure By-law.

## 2.0 Scope

2.1 In accordance with Section 270(1) of the *Municipal Act, 2001, S.O. 2001,* c. 25, this policy applies to members of County Council and officers and employees of the Corporation.

## 3.0 Purpose

This Policy provides guidance on how the Corporation of the County of Essex ensures a respectful, tolerant, and harassment-free relationship and workplace between members of Essex County Council and the officers and employees of the Corporation.

Number: 2019-001

#### 4.0 Definitions

- 4.1 **CAO:** means the County's Chief Administrative Officer.
- 4.2 **Code of Conduct:** means the current By-Law to Establish a Code of Conduct for Members of Council of The Corporation of the County of Essex, and any successor by-law of The Corporation of the County of Essex, setting out a code of conduct for Council Members.
- 4.3 **Corporation:** means the Corporation of the County of Essex.
- 4.4 **Council Member:** means a member of the Council of the Corporation of the County of Essex.
- 4.5 **County:** means the Corporation of the County of Essex.
- 4.6 **County Council:** means the elected body of the Corporation of the County of Essex.
- 4.7 **Staff Member/Employee:** means the officers and employees of The Corporation of the County of Essex including the CAO and individuals providing services to the Corporation under contracts for services.
- 4.8 **Warden:** means the head of County Council as elected by Essex County Council members from time to time.

## **5.0** Policy

The relationship between members of County Council and the officers and employees of the Corporation is guided by the following:

## 5.1 Code of Conduct for Members of Essex County Council

- 5.1.1 The Code of Conduct for members of Essex County Council established the ethical behaviour expected of members of the Council of the Corporation of the County of Essex and citizen members appointed by Council to serve on Committees/Boards/Agencies.
- 5.1.2 Section 8.0 of the Essex County Council Code of Conduct, entitled "Discreditable Conduct" states:

"All Members have a duty to treat members of the public, one another and staff appropriately and without abuse,

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bullying or intimidation. All Members shall ensure that their work environment is utterly free and completely devoid of discrimination, and personal and sexual harassment".

5.1.3 Section 9.0 of the Essex County Council Code of Conduct, entitled "Conduct Respecting Staff" states:

"Members shall be respectful of the role of staff to provide advice based on political neutrality and objectivity and without undue influence from any individual member or faction of the Council or Local Board.

Members of Council should not:

- Maliciously or falsely injure the professional or ethical reputation, or the prospects or practice of staff;
- Compel staff to engage in partisan political activities or be subject to threat or discrimination for refusing to engage in such activities;
- Use, or attempt to use, their authority or influence for the purpose of intimidating, threatening, coercing, commanding, or influencing any staff member with the intent of interfering in staff's duties"

## 5.2 **Employee Code of Conduct**

- 5.2.1 The Employee Code of Conduct is founded on the notion of ensuring public confidence and trust in the integrity, objectivity and impartiality of the Corporation through the recognition and promotion of fundamental principles transparency, accountability, impartiality, and respect.
- 5.2.2 Under the "Council's Expectations of Staff in Support of Council" section, the Employee Code of Conduct states that Council expects staff:

"To Act with integrity and be honest in their dealings with Members of Council, Officers of the Corporation, other County employees, clients and the public. No employee shall withhold information from, or willfully mislead Member of Council, officers and employees, clients and the public.

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No employee shall withhold information from (save and except applicable information protected under laws and regulations), or willfully mislead Members of Council, officers, employees, clients or the public about any issue of corporate concern."

#### 5.2.3 Employees of the Corporation are expected to:

- Recognize that County Council is the elected voice of the citizens of its seven member municipalities and respect the decisions of County Council; and
- Distinguish between their own personal comments or opinions and those related to their employment with the Corporation.
- 5.2.4 Employees of the Corporation are not expected to:
  - Make comments that disparage or harm the reputation of the County of Essex or its' Council or their co-workers; and
  - Claim to speak on behalf of the Corporation unless they have been authorized to do so; and
  - Make personal comments using Corporate letterhead, Corporate email addresses, or anything else that implies a connection between our personal comments or opinions and the Corporation.

## 5.3 **Harassment in the Workplace Policy**

The County of Essex Employee Harassment in the Workplace policy states that its purpose is:

5.3.1 "To promote and maintain a working environment that is free from all types of harassment. To establish procedures for employees of the Corporation who believe that they are being harassed by the Corporation, or by customers, clients, other employees, supervisors, workers, elected officials, vendors, supplier, contractors and members of the public as applicable. To adhere to and enforce applicable legislation including the Ontario Human Rights Code and the Occupational Health and Safety Act."

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## 5.4 Workplace Violence Policy

The County of Essex Workplace Violence Policy states as follows:

5.4.1 "The Corporation is committed to early identification and prevention of violence in the workplace, and to respond swiftly to actual incidents of violence. Any form or manner of threatening remark or gesture made to an employee of the Corporation, while the employee is carrying out his/her duties, will not be tolerated".

## 5.5 **Procedure By-law**

The Procedure By-law established rules, procedures and conduct within Council and Committee meetings. Specifically, Subsection 15.4, under the "Rules of Conduct of Debate" section, states as follows:

5.5.1 "No member shall speak disrespectfully of the reigning Sovereign or of any member of the Royal Family, or of the Governor-General, Lieutenant-Governor, or person administering the government of the Dominion or of this Province, nor shall the use of offensive words in or against the Council or against any member thereof be allowed, nor shall any member speak aside from the motion in debate, and no member shall reflect upon any vote of the Council except for the purpose of moving that such vote be reconsidered, nor shall any member resist the rules of the Council, or disobey the decision of the Presiding Officer of the Council on questions of order or practice or upon the interpretation of the rules of the Council, and in case any member shall so resist or disobey, such member may be ordered by the Council to leave his/her seat for that meeting, and in case of refusing to do so, may, on the order of the Presiding Officer, be removed by the police, but in case of ample apology being made by the offender, may by vote of the Council be permitted forthwith to take his/her seat."

## **6.0** Responsibilities

6.1 Members of Council and officers and employees of the Corporation are required to adhere to this policy and its governing provisions, including the Code of Conduct for Members of Council, the Employee

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Code of Conduct, the Workplace Violence Policy, the Harassment in the Workplace Policy and Procedure By-law.

## 7.0 Delegated Authority

- 7.1 The Director of Council and Community Services/Clerk shall be responsible for receiving complaints and /or concerns related to this policy. Upon receipt of a complaint and/or concern, the Director shall notify:
  - 7.1.1 In the case of officers and employees of the Corporation, the Director responsible for the employee and the Director of Human Resources.
  - 7.1.2 In the case of a member of Council, the Integrity Commissioner.
- 7.2 Where there is a discrepancy between the Council-Staff Relations Policy and the Code of Conduct for Members of Council or Employee Code of Conduct, the language of the Code prevails.
- 7.3 This policy shall be reviewed, at minimum, once per term of Council.

- 3.2 "CAO" means the County's Chief Administrative Officer. As provided for in Section 229 of the Municipal Act, the County may appoint a CAO, who shall be responsible for, (a) exercising general control and management of the affairs of the County for the purpose of ensuring the efficient and effective operation of the County; and (b) performing such other duties as are assigned by the County, from time to time.
- 3.3 "Clerk" means the Clerk, duly appointed by Council pursuant to a by-law. As provided for in Section 228 of the Municipal Act, the County must appoint a Clerk whose duty it is, (a) to record, without note or comment, all resolutions, decisions and other proceedings of Council; (b) if required by any member present at a vote, to record the name and vote of every member voting on any matter or question; (c) to keep the originals or copies of all by-laws and of all minutes of the proceedings of Council; (d) to perform the other duties required under the Municipal Act, or under any other legislation; and (e) to perform such other duties as are assigned by the County, from time to time.
- 3.4 "Code of Conduct" means Appendix A to By-law 2023-48, being the current Code of Conduct for Council Members, and Members of Local Boards, and any successor by-law setting out a code of conduct for Council Members. As provided for in Section 223.2(1) of the Municipal Act, the County must establish codes of conduct for Members of Council and of its local boards.

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<#>This Policy provides guidance on how the Corporation of the County of Essex ensures a respectful, tolerant, and harassment-free relationship and workplace between members of Essex County Council and the officers and employees of the Corporation.

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- 3.5 "County" means the upper tier municipality of the Corporation of the County of Essex.
- 3.6 "Council Member" means a member of the Council of the County.

  As provided for in Section 224 of the Municipal Act, it is the role of Council, (a) to represent the public and to consider the well-being and interests of the County; (b) to develop and evaluate the policies and programs of the County; (c) to determine which services the County provides; (d) to ensure that administrative policies, practices, and procedures and controllership policies, practices, and procedures are in place to implement the decisions of Council; (d.1) to ensure the accountability and transparency of the operations of the County, including the activities of the senior management of the County; (e) to maintain the financial integrity of the County; and (f) to carry out the duties of Council under the Municipal Act, or any other legislation.
- 3.7 "County Council" means the entire elected body of the County, comprised of the 7 Mayors and 7 Deputy Mayors of the County's 7 Jower tier municipalities, being the lower-tier municipalities of Amherstburg, Essex, Kingsville, Lakeshore, LaSalle, Leamington and Tecumseh.

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- 3.8 "Local Board" means a municipal service board, transportation commission, public library board, board of health, police service board, planning board, or any other board, commission, committee, body or local authority established or exercising any power under any Act with respect to the affairs or purposes of one or more municipalities, excluding a school board and a conservation authority;
- 3.9 "Municipal Act" means the Municipal Act, 2001, S.O. 2001, c. 25.
- 3.10 "Senior Leadership Team" means those members of Administration that the CAO, from time to time, determines are to serve as members of the County's senior management team, and includes, but is not limited to, the Directors of the various Departments of the County.
- 3.11 "Warden" means the head of County Council as elected by Council from time to time. As provided for in Section 225 of the Municipal Act, it is the role of the Warden as head of Council, (a) to act as chief executive officer of the County; (b) to preside over meetings of Council so that its business can be carried out efficiently and

effectively; (c) to provide leadership to Council; (c.1) without limiting clause (c), to provide information and recommendations to Council with respect to the role of Council described in clauses 224 (d) and (d.1) of the *Municipal Act*; (d) to represent the County at official functions; and (e) to carry out the duties of the head of Council under the *Municipal Act*, or any other legislation.

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#### 4.0 Purpose

- 4.1 This Policy provides direction on how the County ensures a respectful, tolerant, and harassment-free relationship and workplace between Council Members and Administration.
- 4.2 Council Members and Administration are expected to work together collaboratively to execute the goals and objectives of the County in accordance with the service levels, priorities, and direction set by Council.

## 5.0 Policy

5.1 The relationship between Council Members and Administration is guided by the following:

## Code of Conduct for Council Members, and Members of Local Boards

- 5.1.1 The Code of Conduct establishes the ethical behaviour expected of Council Members and citizen members appointed by Council to serve on Committees, Boards, and/or Agencies of the County.
- 5.1.2 Section, 5.0 of the Code of Conduct, entitled "Respectful Conduct" states:
  - 5.1 A Member shall always act civility, respectfully and professionally when dealing with or communicating with any persons, including a member of the public and other Members as well as staff of the County.
  - 5.2 An individual Member neither directs nor oversees the functions of the staff of the County. Council as a whole approves the budget, policies and governance of the County and provides direction and instruction through its by-laws and resolutions.

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- 5.3 Staff serve Council and work for the County as a body corporate under the specific direction of the CAO.

  Members shall acknowledge, respect and have regard for the administration, managerial and organizational structure of the County when requesting information, advice or services from staff.
- 5.4 A Member shall comply with the County's Council and Staff Relations Policy.
- 5.5 A Member shall not publicly criticize staff and any issue with respect to any staff member shall be referred to the CAO who will direct the matter to the particular staff member's appropriate superior (if not the CAO).
- 5.6 A Member shall respect the role of staff in the administration of the business and governmental affairs of the County, and acknowledge and appreciate that staff:
  - a) provide advice and make policy recommendations in accordance with their professional ethics, expertise and obligations and that a Member must not falsely or maliciously injure the reputation of Staff members whether professional or ethical or otherwise;
  - b) work within the administration of justice and that a Member must not make requests, statements or take actions which may be construed as an attempt to influence the independent administration of justice and, therefore, a Member shall not attempt to intimidate, threaten, or influence any staff member from carrying out that person's duties, including any duty to disclose improper activity; and
  - c) carry out their municipal duties based on political neutrality and without undue influence from any individual Member and, therefore, a Member must not invite nor request or pressure any staff to act in furtherance or any Member's individual direction, to engage in partisan political activities or be subjected to any reprisal for refusing to engage in such activities.

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5.1.3 Section 9.0 of the Code of Conduct, entitled "Discrimination and Harassment" states:

**Deleted:** Conduct Respecting Staff

9.1 A Member shall treat all members of the public, one another and staff with respect and without abuse, bullying or intimidation and ensure that their work environment is free from discrimination and harassment.

9.2 A Member shall not use indecent, abusive, demeaning or insulting words, phrases or expressions toward any member of the public, another Member or staff.

- 9.3 A Member shall not make comments or conduct themselves in any manner that is discriminatory to any individual based on the individual's race, colour, ancestry, citizenship, ethnic origin, place of origin, creed or religion, gender, gender identity, gender expression, sexual orientation, marital status, family status, disability, age or record of offences for which a pardon has not been granted.
- 9.4 A Member shall comply with the County's Workplace Violence and Harassment Policy and Program.
- 5.1.4 Section 16.0 of the Code of Conduct, entitled "Respect for the Code of Conduct" states:

16.5 Staff shall remain neutral and impartial, and not seek to interfere with or attempt to subvert or obstruct the Integrity Commissioner in any way in carrying out its responsibilities and functions. Staff shall comply with any requests from the Integrity Commissioner for any assistance or information.

## 5.2 **Employee Code of Conduct**

- 5.2.1 The Employee Code of Conduct is founded on the notion of ensuring public confidence and trust in the integrity, objectivity, and impartiality of the County through the recognition and promotion of fundamental principles of transparency, accountability, impartiality, and respect.
- 5.2.2 Council expectation of Administration is outlined in Section 23.0 of the Employee Code of Conduct, entitled, "Council's Expectations of Staff in Support of Council", which states:

  - Not make comments that disparage or harm the reputation of the County, its Council, and/or other members of Administration;
  - Not claim to speak on behalf of the <u>County unless they</u> have been authorized to do so; and
  - Not make personal comments using County letterhead, County email addresses, or anything else that implies a connection between their personal comments or opinions and the County.

#### 5.3 Harassment in the Workplace Policy

"To promote and maintain a working environment that is free from all types of harassment. #### 5.5 **Procedure By-law**

The Procedure By-law establishes the rules, procedures, and conduct for meetings of Council and Committees. Specifically, Section 15.5 of the Procedure By-law states as follows:

**15.5** No Member shall:

- 15.5.1 speak disrespectfully of the Reigning Sovereign or of any member of the Royal Family, or of the Governor-General, Lieutenant-Governor, or person administering the government of the Dominion of Canada or of this Province or any Province, or of a fellow Member of Council or staff;
- 15.5.2 Use offensive words or unparliamentary language; nor speak on any subject other than the subject from the motion in debate;
- 15.5.3 reflect upon any vote of Council except for the purpose of moving that such vote be reconsidered;
- 15.5.4 resist the rules of Council, or disobey the decision of the Chair on questions of order or practice or upon the interpretation of the rules of Council
- 15.6 Where a Member has been called to order by the Chair for failing to observe the provision of Section 15.4, and the Member persists in any such conduct, such Member may be ordered by Council to leave

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their seat for that Meeting, and in case of refusing to do so, may, on the order of the Chair, be removed by the police, but in case of ample apology being made by the offender, may by vote of Council be permitted forthwith to take their seat.

#### 6.0 Responsibility

6.1 It is the responsibility of the CAO and other members of Administration to fully research the issues being put before Council, to provide Council with the information required for Council to make a decision, to give Council, professional advice within their area of expertise (including viable policy options), to make recommendations to Council, and, once Council has rendered a decision or otherwise provide direction on a matter, to implement, Council's decision.

6.1.1 The CAO reports to Council, while all other members of Administration report to the CAO.

- 6.1.2 Council Members shall report any concerns regarding the CAO to the Warden and shall report any concerns regarding other members of Administration to the CAO.
- 6.2 It is the responsibility of Council Members and members of Administration to adhere to this Policy and any applicable legislation, governing by-laws, codes of conduct, policies, and procedures.
- 6.3 The members of the Senior Leadership Team are responsible for directing operations under their supervision and leading other members of Administration that report to them to carry out the strategic objectives and directions set by Council. Generally, Senior Leadership is responsible for:
  - 6.3.1 Acting as the liaison between Council and the members of Administration that report to them;
  - 6.3.2 Directing the implementation of Council's stated objectives and decisions related to operations under their supervision;
  - 6.3.3 Providing information and advice to Council as needed; and
  - 6.3.4 Hiring, developing, and overseeing/managing a team of competent individuals.

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**Deleted:** Members of Council and officers and employees of the Corporation are required to adhere to this policy and its governing provisions

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- 6.4 Generally, County Administration is responsible for:
  - 6.4.1 Implementing decisions of Council, as directed by the CAO and/or the applicable member of the Senior Leadership Team;
  - 6.4.2 Establishing administrative practices and procedures to carry out Council's decisions, as directed by the CAO and/or the applicable member of the Senior Leadership Team;
  - 6.4.3 Researching and providing advice to Council as needed;
  - 6.4.4 Fulfilling any applicable statutory duties; and
  - 6.4.5 Following direction of the CAO and/or Senior Leadership Team to ensure the successful operation of the County.

6.5 The Clerk is responsible for receiving complaints and/or concerns related to this Policy, and, upon receipt of a complaint and/or concern, the Clerk shall notify:

- 6.5.1 In the case of a complaint or concern related to the CAO, the Clerk shall notify the Warden;
- 6.5.2 In the case of a complaint or concern related to a member of the Senior Leadership Team, the Clerk shall notify the CAO;
- 6.5.3 In the case of a complaint or concern related to a member of Administration, but not the CAO or a member of the Senior Leadership Team, the Clerk shall notify the Director, Human Resources and the member of the Senior Leadership Team, responsible for the member of Administration in question;
- 6.5.4 In the case of a complaint or concern related to a Council Member, the Clerk shall direct the complainant to follow the procedures set out by the County's Integrity Commissioner, and will provide the complainant with the resources and contact information for this purpose;
- 6.5.5 In the case of a complaint or concern related to the Clerk, the CAO shall be responsible for receiving the complaint and shall address the complaint with the Clerk.

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- 6.6 Where there is a discrepancy between this Policy, and the Code of Conduct for Council Members, and Members of Local Boards or Employee Code of Conduct, the language of the Codes of Conduct prevails.
- 6.7 This Policy shall be reviewed, at minimum, once per term of Council.

As provided for in Section 228 of the *Municipal Act*, the County must appoint a Clerk whose duty it is, (a) to record, without note or comment, all resolutions, decisions and other proceedings of Council; (b) if required by any member present at a vote, to record the name and vote of every member voting on any matter or question; (c) to keep the originals or copies of all by-laws and of all minutes of the proceedings of Council; (d) to perform the other duties required under the *Municipal Act*, or under any other legislation; and (e) to perform such other duties as are assigned by the County, from time to time.
- "Code of Conduct" means Appendix A to By-law 2023-48, being the current Code of Conduct for Council Members, and Members of Local Boards, and any successor by-law setting out a code of conduct for Council Members. As provided for in Section 223.2(1) of the Municipal Act, the County must establish codes of conduct for Members of Council and of its local boards.

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- 3.5 **"County"** means the upper tier municipality of the Corporation of the County of Essex.
- "Council Member" means a member of the Council of the County. As provided for in Section 224 of the *Municipal Act*, it is the role of Council, (a) to represent the public and to consider the well-being and interests of the County; (b) to develop and evaluate the policies and programs of the County; (c) to determine which services the County provides; (d) to ensure that administrative policies, practices, and procedures and controllership policies, practices, and procedures are in place to implement the decisions of Council; (d.1) to ensure the accountability and transparency of the operations of the County, including the activities of the senior management of the County; (e) to maintain the financial integrity of the County; and (f) to carry out the duties of Council under the *Municipal Act*, or any other legislation.
- 3.7 "County Council" means the entire elected body of the County, comprised of the 7 Mayors and 7 Deputy Mayors of the County's 7 lower tier municipalities, being the lower-tier municipalities of Amherstburg, Essex, Kingsville, Lakeshore, LaSalle, Leamington and Tecumseh.
- 3.8 **"Local Board"** means a municipal service board, transportation commission, public library board, board of health, police service board, planning board, or any other board, commission, committee, body or local authority established or exercising any power under any Act with respect to the affairs or purposes of one or more municipalities, excluding a school board and a conservation authority;
- 3.9 **"Municipal Act"** means the *Municipal Act, 2001*, S.O. 2001, c. 25.
- 3.10 "Senior Leadership Team" means those members of Administration that the CAO, from time to time, determines are to serve as members of the County's senior management team, and includes, but is not limited to, the Directors of the various Departments of the County.
- 3.11 "Warden" means the head of County Council as elected by Council from time to time. As provided for in Section 225 of the *Municipal Act*, it is the role of the Warden as head of Council, (a) to act as chief executive officer of the County; (b) to preside over meetings of Council so that its business can be carried out efficiently and

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effectively; (c) to provide leadership to Council; (c.1) without limiting clause (c), to provide information and recommendations to Council with respect to the role of Council described in clauses 224 (d) and (d.1) of the *Municipal Act*; (d) to represent the County at official functions; and (e) to carry out the duties of the head of Council under the *Municipal Act*, or any other legislation.

## 4.0 Purpose

- 4.1 This Policy provides direction on how the County ensures a respectful, tolerant, and harassment-free relationship and workplace between Council Members and Administration.
- 4.2 Council Members and Administration are expected to work together collaboratively to execute the goals and objectives of the County in accordance with the service levels, priorities, and direction set by Council.

## 5.0 Policy

The relationship between Council Members and Administration is guided by the following:

# 5.1 Code of Conduct for Council Members, and Members of Local Boards

- 5.1.1 The Code of Conduct establishes the ethical behaviour expected of Council Members and citizen members appointed by Council to serve on Committees, Boards, and/or Agencies of the County.
- 5.1.2 Section 5.0 of the Code of Conduct, entitled "Respectful Conduct" states:
  - 5.1 A Member shall always act civility, respectfully and professionally when dealing with or communicating with any persons, including a member of the public and other Members as well as staff of the County.
  - 5.2 An individual Member neither directs nor oversees the functions of the staff of the County. Council as a whole approves the budget, policies and governance of the County and provides direction and instruction through its by-laws and resolutions.

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- 5.3 Staff serve Council and work for the County as a body corporate under the specific direction of the CAO. Members shall acknowledge, respect and have regard for the administration, managerial and organizational structure of the County when requesting information, advice or services from staff.
- 5.4 A Member shall comply with the County's Council and Staff Relations Policy.
- 5.5 A Member shall not publicly criticize staff and any issue with respect to any staff member shall be referred to the CAO who will direct the matter to the particular staff member's appropriate superior (if not the CAO).
- 5.6 A Member shall respect the role of staff in the administration of the business and governmental affairs of the County, and acknowledge and appreciate that staff:
  - a) provide advice and make policy recommendations in accordance with their professional ethics, expertise and obligations and that a Member must not falsely or maliciously injure the reputation of Staff members whether professional or ethical or otherwise;
  - b) work within the administration of justice and that a Member must not make requests, statements or take actions which may be construed as an attempt to influence the independent administration of justice and, therefore, a Member shall not attempt to intimidate, threaten, or influence any staff member from carrying out that person's duties, including any duty to disclose improper activity; and
  - c) carry out their municipal duties based on political neutrality and without undue influence from any individual Member and, therefore, a Member must not invite nor request or pressure any staff to act in furtherance or any Member's individual direction, to engage in partisan political activities or be subjected to any reprisal for refusing to engage in such activities.

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- 5.1.3 Section 9.0 of the Code of Conduct, entitled "Discrimination and Harassment" states:
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  - 9.4 A Member shall comply with the County's Workplace Violence and Harassment Policy and Program.
- 5.1.4 Section 16.0 of the Code of Conduct, entitled "Respect for the Code of Conduct" states:
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## 5.3 Harassment in the Workplace Policy

5.3.1 The County's Employee Harassment in the Workplace policy states that its purpose is:

"To promote and maintain a working environment that is free from all types of harassment. To establish procedures for employees of the Corporation who believe that they are being harassed by the Corporation, or by customers, clients, other employees, supervisors, workers, elected officials, vendors,

supplier, contractors and members of the public as applicable. To adhere to and enforce applicable legislation including the Ontario Human Rights Code and the Occupational Health and Safety Act."

## 5.4 Workplace Violence Policy

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"The Corporation is committed to early identification and prevention of violence in the workplace, and to respond swiftly to actual incidents of violence. Any form or manner of threatening remark or gesture made to an employee of the Corporation, while the employee is carrying out his/her duties, will not be tolerated".

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- 15.5.2 Use offensive words or unparliamentary language; nor speak on any subject other than the subject from the motion in debate;
- 15.5.3 reflect upon any vote of Council except for the purpose of moving that such vote be reconsidered;
- 15.5.4 resist the rules of Council, or disobey the decision of the Chair on questions of order or practice or upon the interpretation of the rules of Council

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15.6 Where a Member has been called to order by the Chair for failing to observe the provision of Section 15.4, and the Member persists in any such conduct, such Member may be ordered by Council to leave their seat for that Meeting, and in case of refusing to do so, may, on the order of the Chair, be removed by the police, but in case of ample apology being made by the offender, may by vote of Council be permitted forthwith to take their seat.

## 6.0 Responsibility

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  - 6.1.1 The CAO reports to Council, while all other members of Administration report to the CAO.
  - 6.1.2 Council Members shall report any concerns regarding the CAO to the Warden and shall report any concerns regarding other members of Administration to the CAO.
- 6.2 It is the responsibility of Council Members and members of Administration to adhere to this Policy and any applicable legislation, governing by-laws, codes of conduct, policies, and procedures.
- 6.3 The members of the Senior Leadership Team are responsible for directing operations under their supervision and leading other members of Administration that report to them to carry out the strategic objectives and directions set by Council. Generally, Senior Leadership is responsible for:
  - 6.3.1 Acting as the liaison between Council and the members of Administration that report to them;
  - 6.3.2 Directing the implementation of Council's stated objectives and decisions related to operations under their supervision;

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- 6.3.3 Providing information and advice to Council as needed; and
- 6.3.4 Hiring, developing, and overseeing/managing a team of competent individuals.
- 6.4 Generally, County Administration is responsible for:
  - 6.4.1 Implementing decisions of Council, as directed by the CAO and/or the applicable member of the Senior Leadership Team;
  - 6.4.2 Establishing administrative practices and procedures to carry out Council's decisions, as directed by the CAO and/or the applicable member of the Senior Leadership Team;
  - 6.4.3 Researching and providing advice to Council as needed;
  - 6.4.4 Fulfilling any applicable statutory duties; and
  - 6.4.5 Following direction of the CAO and/or Senior Leadership Team to ensure the successful operation of the County.
- 6.5 The Clerk is responsible for receiving complaints and/or concerns related to this Policy, and, upon receipt of a complaint and/or concern, the Clerk shall notify:
  - 6.5.1 In the case of a complaint or concern related to the CAO, the Clerk shall notify the Warden;
  - 6.5.2 In the case of a complaint or concern related to a member of the Senior Leadership Team, the Clerk shall notify the CAO;
  - 6.5.3 In the case of a complaint or concern related to a member of Administration, but not the CAO or a member of the Senior Leadership Team, the Clerk shall notify the Director, Human Resources and the member of the Senior Leadership Team responsible for the member of Administration in question;
  - 6.5.4 In the case of a complaint or concern related to a Council Member, the Clerk shall direct the complainant to follow the procedures set out by the County's Integrity Commissioner, and will provide the complainant with the resources and contact information for this purpose;

- 6.5.5 In the case of a complaint or concern related to the Clerk, the CAO shall be responsible for receiving the complaint and shall address the complaint with the Clerk.
- 6.6 Where there is a discrepancy between this Policy, and the Code of Conduct for Council Members, and Members of Local Boards or Employee Code of Conduct, the language of the Codes of Conduct prevails.
- 6.7 This Policy shall be reviewed, at minimum, once per term of Council.

## Purpose

The purpose of this Administrative Report (the "**Report**") is to report back to Council as per Council's direction provided on January 15, 2025, and to seek County Council's direction regarding the procurement process related to the County's Intensive Supportive Housing Program.

## **Background**

On January 15, 2025, following the presentation of Report Number 2025-0115-LLS-R05-DMS (the "**January Report**"), Council provided the following resolution:

Essex County Council direct Administration to commence a formal procurement process with respect to an Intensive Supportive Housing Program in the County, report back to Council regarding the outcome of same and for further direction, to pursue a short-term contract with a service provider until the RFP process concludes.

A copy of the January Report is appended to this Report as **Appendix A** for ease of reference.

The following is a summary of the current status of how homelessness prevention programs are funded and carried out in the County:

- 1) Since the 1990s the City of Windsor has been the Consolidated Regional Service Manager for social services for both the City and the County.
- 2) The City receives funding from both the provincial and federal governments to provide social services, including programs related to addressing homelessness in both the City and the County.

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- Any shortfall in funding from the provincial and federal governments results in the additional costs shared as follows: 40% of funding is based on actual costs, 60% is based on regional weighted assessment (however, Pelee is excluded from this weighted assessment specifically for Social Housing only). Please see **Appendix B** for the details of this arbitrated decision.
- 4) For 2024 the County was billed \$18,467,604, which is subject to final reconciliation by the City. The total costs of the Regional Social Services and Social Housing Programs are cost shared as indicated above and referenced in **Appendix B.**
- From the provincial funding available to the Region, the City directly provides money to the County for the County's homelessness initiatives, from a source of funding known as the Homelessness Prevention Program ("**HPP**").
- The HPP allotment that is dedicated to the County's homelessness initiatives has been set at \$2,491,240 for 2025, and is supplemented by \$448,640 from the County's municipal tax levy.
- 7) Effective as of April 1, 2024, the relationship between the City and the County regarding the allotment of HPP funding has been governed by the terms of a funding agreement (the "**Funding Agreement**").
- 8) Traditionally, the HPP funds provided by the Province through the City were used to fund what is now known as "Residential Services Homes", which was formerly known as the "Housing with Supports" Program (the "**Traditional Supportive Housing Program**").
- 9) The Traditional Supportive Housing Program has been used to provide permanent housing, food services, supervised care, and other supports, to low income individuals who require some assistance with activities of daily living.
- 10) The Funding Agreement now provides the County with a set amount of funds for the Traditional Supportive Housing Program along with the operation of a Homelessness Hub in Leamington, the operation of an Emergency Shelter Program in the County, and a dedicated Homelessness Street Outreach Worker.
- 11) In 2022, the County and City each began operating a supportive housing program that was more intensive than the Traditional Supportive Housing Program, in that it provided specialized supports to those individuals experiencing homelessness and that are facing complex medical needs and/or mental health and/or addiction issues (the "Intensive Supportive Housing Program").

- 12) The City, as the Consolidated Regional Service Manager, has decided to fund the City's Intensive Supportive Housing Program (the "City's Program") differently than the County's Intensive Supportive Housing Program (the "County's Program"). The difference means that the City's Program receives approximately \$200,000 more per year from provincial funds than the County's Program does, but with approximately 50% of the cost of the City's Program being funded from the City's municipal taxes. Conversely, to date, the County's Program has not received any support from municipal taxes.
- 13) The County's Program is set to expire on March 31, 2025, which resulted in the January Report being presented to Council, and resulted in direction from Council to engage in a formal procurement process and report back to Council.

#### Discussion

In accordance with the direction provided by Council to Administration on January 15, 2025, a formal procurement process was commenced by the County, which closed on February 20, 2025 (the "**Procurement Process**").

The Procurement Process resulted in 2 submissions being provided to continue the County's Program. However, 1 of the submissions was largely in line with how the Traditional Supportive Housing Program is operated and did not fully meet the technical requirements for the County's Intensive Supportive Housing Program.

The other submission provided to the County as part of the Procurement Process did meet the technical requirements for the County's Intensive Supportive Housing Program, and Administration recommends proceeding to attempt to negotiate a Contract with that proponent (the "**Preferred Proponent**"). The Preferred Proponent will have to secure a location to operate the County's Program from in a reasonable amount of time. Should the Preferred Proponent fail to do so, then the County's Program will have to be wound up.

The Preferred Proponent has provided costs for running the County's Program that includes the following:

- 1) A focus on striving to meet the medical and mental health needs of the residents of the County's Program, with a mental health worker and PSW to be on site at all times, and with an RPN on site from 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM every Monday through Friday.
- 2) An Executive Director with a mental health background, who will be on site to address risk issues as they arise.

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3) A proposed staff schedule that seeks to ensure that mental health expertise is always available on site.

It is the opinion of the Evaluation Committee of the County, tasked with making a recommendation from the Procurement Process, that the Preferred Proponent is the most likely to successfully deliver the County's Program as:

- 1) The proposal is for a program with qualified staff and with a level of staffing that is required to successfully deliver this type of program.
- 2) The proposal clearly identifies the key needs of the residents of the County's Program and provides a plan to address those needs.
- 3) The Preferred Proponent provides services to the County through the Traditional Supportive Housing Program, and has a good track record of providing quality service.

Finally, since the January Report was drafted and presented to Council, it was also announced that the City was approved to open and operate a Homeless and Addiction Recovery Treatment ("**HART**") Hub program. Funding for the HART Hub has been announced to be \$6,300,000 per year, and will initially house 16 individuals.

The announcement from the Provincial Government summarized the HART Hub Program as follows:

- The goal of the Windsor-Essex HART Hub is to bring community partners together, through a shared model of care, to effectively and compassionately support individuals experiencing homelessness, addictions issues, and other complex issues.
- The Windsor-Essex HART Hub proposed services include:
  - primary care
  - mental health and addictions services including, assessment, care coordination withdrawal management
  - peer support
  - mental health and addictions supportive housing
  - services to meet basic needs
- The **primary objective** of the Windsor-Essex HART Hub is to divert repeated/inappropriate emergency department visits by providing individuals with more immediate access to help and efficiently using local community resources.

## **Financial Implications**

County Homelessness Programs vary in cost. **Appendix C** provides details on available programs, the individuals they serve, and associated funding sources.

If Council directs Administration to negotiate a contract to continue the Intensive Supportive Housing Program, total program costs through 2025 are expected to remain at approximately \$107,000 per month, consistent with current expenditures.

The program's costs will be partially offset by:

- 1) Provincial funding through the Funding Agreement
- 2) Rent recoveries from residents
- 3) Surplus funds, if any, from the County's Homelessness Programs However, even with these funding sources, a significant funding gap will remain, which the County will need to cover.

To cover the 2025 funding gap, Administration recommends using Safe Restart funds for the remainder of the year. However, long-term funding must be addressed in the 2026 Budget deliberations and incorporated into the County's levy starting in 2026 should Council wish to continue this program and in the absence of any other available funding.

The table below provides the estimated total program costs over five years, along with the corresponding County funds needed to cover the anticipated unfunded portion of the program for 35 residents.

The chart above is based on 35 residents utilizing the program and the program being bloc funded.

There is no rental supplements included as revenue as this is not guaranteed.

Alternatively, if Council directs Administration to discontinue the County's Program, there will still be associated costs, though they are more difficult to quantify. As noted in the January Report, anecdotal evidence suggests that homelessness leads to increased expenses for the shelter system, healthcare, and emergency services.

Since the County reimburses the City for 40% of direct social services and social housing costs and 60% based on weighted assessment—and shares EMS costs with the City—any rise in demand for emergency shelter, social housing or emergency response will have financial implications for County taxpayers.

Below is a table identifying the per diem costs of housing individuals in the County's Intensive Supportive Housing Program for Year 1 versus the costs for housing someone in the emergency shelter system or the new HART Hub.

#### **Purpose**

The purpose of this Administrative Report (the "**Report**") is to seek direction from County Council as to whether or not the County should continue to have an Intensive Supportive Housing Program in the County.

## **Background**

As Council is well aware, in the 1990s when the Province downloaded certain provincial responsibilities to municipalities, it appointed the City of Windsor (the "City") as the Consolidated Regional Service Manager for social services for both the City and the County of Essex (the "County"). Since that appointment as the Consolidated Regional Service Manager, the City has been provided with funding from both the provincial and federal governments to provide social services, including programs related to addressing homelessness in both the City and the County.

For many years, the City has provided the County with an allocation of money that fluctuates slightly from year to year for homelessness initiatives. The funding is currently from a provincial funding source known as the Homelessness Prevention Program ("**HPP**"). The HPP allotment from the provincial funds provided to the County for 2025 is currently set at \$2,491,240.

For a number of years, the County has contributed County municipal tax dollars in the sum of \$448,640 to supplement the amount provided by the Province through the City. Further the County has provided County employees as support staff to oversee/manage the HPP funded programs in the County. Finally, effective April 1, 2024, the City and the County entered

into an agreement to formalize the County overseeing/managing HPP funded programs on behalf of the City in the County (the "Funding Agreement").

Traditionally, the HPP funds provided by the Province through the City were used to fund what is now known as "Residential Services Homes", which was formerly known as the "Housing with Supports" Program (the "**Traditional Supportive Housing Program**"). The Traditional Supportive Housing Program has been used to provide permanent housing, food services, supervised care, and other supports, to low income individuals who require some assistance with activities of daily living.

The Funding Agreement now provides the County with a set amount of funds for the Traditional Supportive Housing Program along with the operation of a Homelessness Hub in Leamington, the operation of an Emergency Shelter Program in the County, and a dedicated Homelessness Street Outreach Worker.

In 2022, the County and the City each began operating a supportive housing program that was more intense than the Traditional Supportive Housing Program, in that it provided specialized supports to those individuals experiencing homelessness and that are facing complex medical needs and/or mental health and/or addiction issues (the "Intensive Supportive Housing Program").

The City, as the Consolidated Regional Service Manager, has decided to fund the City's Intensive Supportive Housing Program (the "City's Program") differently than the County's Intensive Supportive Housing Program (the "County's Program"). The difference means that the City's Program receives approximately \$200,000 more per year from provincial funds than the County's Program does. That being said, the City's Program is also being sustained through a substantial contribution from the City's municipal tax base. The County's understanding is that approximately 50% of the cost of the City's Program is funded from the City's municipal taxes. Conversely, to date, the County's Program has not received any support from municipal taxes.

The County's Program is currently set to end on March 31, 2025, and will be unable to continue unless there is a commitment from the County to provide municipal tax dollars to subsidize the County's Program and/or a reconsideration by the City as to the amount allocated from the provincial and federal funds available to the Region to support the County's program.

#### **Discussion**

In anticipation of the County's Program ending on March 31, 2025, Administration approached a number of the County's community partners and existing providers of the County's Residential Services Homes Program to obtain some insight on the costs to continue providing the County's Program past March 31, 2025. That approach was made through a process known as a Request for Information ("**RFI**"). The RFI process is used to gain information in a non-binding way. Should County Council wish to further explore continuing the County's Program a formal Request for Quote ("**RFQ**") will be required.

Based on the RFI process, it appears that the County would be required to contribute between \$120,000 a year on the low end and \$390,000 a year on the high end, should County Council wish for the County's Program to continue to operate. The precise amount will not be known unless and until a formal RFQ process is completed.

There is the possibility that the amount required from the County to subsidize the County's Program could be reduced if the City provides the County with a larger amount from the provincial and/or federal funds allotted to the Region as a whole, if another funding source becomes available, or if other service providers with funding from other provincial and/or federal sources can assist with the County's Program. However, that is speculative at this point, with all previous attempts to find alternate funding or supports being unsuccessful.

Direction is required from County Council as to whether it is the desire of Council to continue the operation of the County's Program, or to cease the operation of the County's Program.

## **Supplementary Information – Addendum**

Following this Report being provided to Council, Administration learned that on January 9, 2025, AMO published a Report entitled "Municipalities Under Pressure: The Human and Financial Cost of Ontario's Homelessness Crisis" (the "AMO Report"). The AMO Report was conducted by HelpSeeker Technologies, in partnership with the Association of Municipalities of Ontario ("AMO"), the Ontario Municipal Social Services Association, and the Northern Ontario Service Deliverers Association. On January 9, 2025, AMO provided a press release regarding the AMO Report along with a link to the full AMO Report. Attached to this Report as Appendix A is a copy of the Summary of the AMO Report.

Administration wanted to ensure that the very timely and detailed statistics and information contained in the <u>AMO Report</u>, and the related <u>press release</u>

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and AMO Report Summary, was available to Council prior to Council's discussion regarding the contents of this Report.

## **Financial Implications**

Should Council direct Administration to continue the operation of an Intensive Supportive Housing Program in the County, there will be costs, that, through the RFI process, Administration believes will result in an annual obligation of the County of between approximately \$120,000 and \$390,000. However, the precise amount will not be known until a formal procurement process results in a quote being provided that a Proponent is legally obligated to honour.

Should the County Program be continued, Administration recommends funding any transition costs and any further net operating costs of the County Program in 2025 with excess Safe Restart Funds. However, the County will have to be prepared to support the County Program with levy funds in the future, and likely for an extended period of time. Most service providers will expect a multi-year contract before engaging in offering this type of program.

Should Council direct Administration to cease the operation of an Intensive Supportive Housing Program in the County, there will be costs for that as well. Those costs are more difficult to clearly identify. The costs will not likely have a direct impact on the County's municipal levy (other than through the potential for increased calls to EMS), but there will be costs if the people utilizing the current Intensive Supportive Housing Program are left homeless. Anecdotal evidence suggests that homelessness results in increased costs to the shelter system, to the healthcare system, and to emergency services.

## Accordingly, effective April 1, 1999 it is the award of this arbitral tribunal that:

- 1. The mandatory program delivery and administration costs for Ontario Works shall be apportioned between the City of Windsor, the County of Essex and the Township of Pelee based on a formula of 60% weighted assessment and 40% actual costs. Actual costs are the net municipal costs of each case allocated on the basis of the location of the municipal residence of the client.
- 2. The discretionary program delivery costs for Ontario Works shall be apportioned based on 100% of the actual costs as defined in (1.) above.
- 3. The program delivery and administrative costs for Child Care services shall be apportioned between the City of Windsor and the County of Essex based on a formula of 60% weighted assessment and 40% actual costs. Actual costs are the net municipal costs of each subsidized day care space allocated on the basis of the location of the municipal residence of the client. The Township of Pelee is excluded from this apportionment.
- 4. The costs of Social Housing shall be apportioned between the City of Windsor and the County of Essex based on a formula of 60% weighted assessment and 40% actual costs. Actual costs are the net municipal costs of each unit allocated on the basis of the municipal location of the unit. The Township of Pelee is excluded from this apportionment.
- 5. Each party shall be responsible for their own costs relating to this arbitration. The costs of the arbitral tribunal shall be apportioned 40.1785% to the County of Essex, 59.6075% to the City of Windsor, and 0.2140% to the Township of Pelee.

## **AMO Municipal Finance and Economic Development Task Force**

#### **Terms of Reference**

#### Context:

The economic environments of Ontario and Canada have changed substantially over the previous few years. This has led to an interest in relocalizing critical supply chains, facilitating investment in next generation industries, addressing scarcity of skilled talent, and matching talent to available jobs.

Municipal governments are major players in the provincial economy, investing more than \$55 billion each year in services and capital which facilitate economic, social, and cultural development that underpin Ontario's prosperity. Municipalities also manage, maintain, and operate nearly half-a-trillion dollars worth of capital assets aimed at improving transportation and goods movement, environmental and human health, access to recreation and other benefits.

Municipal financing tools do not meet the investment needs of communities to maintain services and support population and economic growth. This has led to an estimated "state of good repair" backlog in infrastructure financing of \$52.1 billion. Significant funding increases are needed beyond this amount to adapt assets to climate change and build resilience for economic and social activity.

The provincial government's response to the housing crisis has been to reduce the ability of municipalities to collect Development Charges for certain types of housing, resulting in a reduction of municipal infrastructure resources of nearly \$1B annually. The multivariate pressures on municipal governments from economic, fiscal, social, and environmental forces requires municipalities to assess options to best position communities as engines of growth and prosperity for the future.

Finally, as the economic environment changes, it is also likely that the federal and provincial governments will seek to prioritize spending in ways which reduce government debt and attract new companies and industries to Ontario and Canada. While municipal governments individually are active in economic development efforts, a municipal framework to consider economic and skills development, infrastructure funding and municipal finance has not been put forward and, a consistent municipal voice in these policy areas would help to align AMO and municipalities to engage with policy makers in these areas.

## Purpose:

The Task Force will help AMO to develop policy and advocacy positions that increase consideration of municipal interests in the areas of municipal finance and funding sources for municipal services and infrastructure, economic, labour market and skills development.

#### Mandate:

The Task Force will provide advice to AMO regarding matters of municipal finance, funding sources for municipal services and infrastructure, economic, labour market and skills development. This advice will be used by AMO to develop advocacy positions for the consideration of the AMO Board.

On a confidential basis, Task Force input may inform AMO-MOU discussions relevant to the mandate. The Task Force will provide a forum and resource to AMO in the relevant areas to improve expertise and influence with municipal governments, the province, federal government, industry, and business associations amongst others.

While specific topics for consideration by the Task Force will be set through discussions between AMO staff and the Chair and Vice-Chair, discussion areas may include:

- the current municipal fiscal framework, including, property assessment and taxation, user fees, alternative revenue sources, debt and investment, and the evolving municipal-provincial fiscal relationship;
- exploring future funding sources for municipal services and infrastructure, such as grant
  programs, expansion of user rates, and expanded revenue tools, especially in light of changing
  investment needs to manage changes in climate and population growth;
- integration of federal, provincial, and municipal economic development and labour market development policies and programs to support innovation, productivity, and prosperity across industries and regions;
- municipal interests in immigration and settlement of newcomers as it pertains to addressing labour market challenges.

Once study topics are agreed, AMO will develop a workplan to guide the Task Force's agendas and direction in subject areas.

## Membership:

Membership will be drawn from across the municipal sector, including elected and appointed officials and will include: Northern, rural, county, single-tier, small and large urban representatives as well as geographic representation. In addition, staff, and municipal officials with expertise in finance and service design, economic development, labour market and skills development, immigration and settlement will be sought.

Additionally, the Task Force will engage with the Ontario Chamber of Commerce, the Economic Development Council of Ontario, and the Toronto Board of Trade. As appropriate, the Task Force will engage with labour organizations, representatives of training organizations such as Colleges Ontario and others specific to an area of examination.

## Meetings:

Meetings will be managed by the Chair in consultation with AMO staff, including setting direction for areas of examination, developing agendas, and identifying relevant stakeholders to engage. In the absence of the Chair, the Vice-Chair will assume the Chair's duties. If both the Chair and Vice-Chair are unavailable, AMO staff will assume these roles.

## Frequency:

The Task Force will normally meet three to four times per year. As needed, sub-groups may be established to provide additional focus on issues and may meet more frequently.

#### **Duration:**

The Task Force is established initially for two years but may be extended to four years. At the two-year mark, mandate and membership will be reviewed to ensure continued integration with AMO priorities, Board representation and membership.

## Integration:

AMO staff and the Task Force Chair and Vice-Chair will ensure integration between Task Force work and directions of inquiry and AMO Strategic Priorities. AMO staff will coordinate the work of the Task Force with other AMO Task Forces and the AMO Board will remain the ultimate integration and decision-making authority on any recommended positions or advice provided.

## 1.0 Purpose

To provide members of County Council and Administration with the guidelines pertaining to membership on Boards and Associations related to the business and interest of the Corporation.

## 2.0 Scope

Applies to all members of County Council and Administration of all departments, divisions or sections of the Corporation.

## 3.0 Responsibility

- 3.1 The Warden is responsible to ensure that the following guidelines are implemented and adhered to by members of County Council.
- 3.2 The Chief Administrative Officer is responsible to ensure that the following guidelines are implemented and adhered to by the members of Administration.

3.3 Members of Council, department, division or section managers are responsible to ensure that they themselves and subordinate staff comply with the requirements of this policy.

## 4.0 General

#### 4.1 Members of Council

- a) Prior to any personal commitment to represent the Corporation of the County of Essex on any Board, Association or the like, the Member must receive the support of County Council by Resolution annually.
- b) In order to obtain the approval of County Council the following procedure is to be followed. At least two (2) weeks prior to the regularly scheduled County Council meeting the member shall request such membership in writing to the Warden. Such request for support must contain the following:
  - Benefit to be derived or enjoyed by the Corporation.
  - Conditions of term of membership, i.e. one, two or more years expected membership by the Board or Association.
  - Frequency of meetings and/or interference with the Councilor's regular attendance at County Council and the various Committees of Council.
  - Projected costs of such membership, i.e. travel, accommodation, per diem costs to the Corporation.

#### 4.2 **Members of Administration**

- a) Prior to any personal commitment to represent the Corporation of the County of Essex on any Board, Association, or the like, the employee must receive the support of County Council by resolution annually
- b) In order to obtain the approval of County Council the following procedure is to be followed. At least two (2)

weeks prior to the regularly scheduled County Council meeting the member shall request such membership in writing to the Warden. Such request for support must contain the following:

- Benefit to be derived or enjoyed by the Corporation.
- Conditions of term of membership, i.e. one, two or more years expected membership by the Board or Association.
- Frequency of meetings and/or interference with the employee's regular work assignments with the Corporation.
- Projected costs of such membership, i.e. travel, accommodation, per diem costs to the Corporation.

## 5.0 Expenses

#### 5.1 Members of Council

- a) The Corporation will pay a \$100.00 per diem, full day only, to cover any personal wage loss that may be experienced by the councilors.
- b) The Corporation will provide a per diem meal allowance of \$50.00 for which receipts are not required and only if attendance at meetings do not provide pre-paid meals.
- c) The Corporation will provide actual and reasonable accommodation as required. Accommodation should be restricted to those establishments that are on the approved list published by A.M.O. or if not available, only at those establishments that provide a Government Rate.
- d) The Corporation will provide transportation to and from the meeting place by personal vehicle, the sharing of a personal vehicle, or by regular coach fare in air or rail transportation.
- e) None of the above expenses relate to or will be paid on behalf of a spouse, companion or other family member.

f) The Warden may approve a deviation from this policy as may be determined by special circumstances.

## 5.2 **Members of Administration**

- a) The Corporation agrees to continue the regular salary of the employee attending approved meetings.
- b) The Corporation will provide a per diem meal allowance of \$50.00 for which receipts are not required and only of attendance at meetings do not provide pre-paid meals.
- c) The Corporation will provide actual and reasonable accommodation as required. Accommodation should, be restricted to those establishments that are on the approved list published by A.M.O., or if not available, only at those establishments that provide a Government Rate.
- d) The Corporation will provide transportation to and from the meeting place by personal vehicle, the sharing of a personal vehicle, or by regular Coach fare on air or rail transportation.
- e) None of the above expenses relate to or will be paid on behalf of a spouse, companion or other family member.
- f) The Chief Administrative Officer may approve a deviation from this policy only with the concurrence of the Warden.
